**An autoethnographic study—Exploring integrative approaches in the Japanese EFL classroom** by *Sanae Oda-Sheehan*



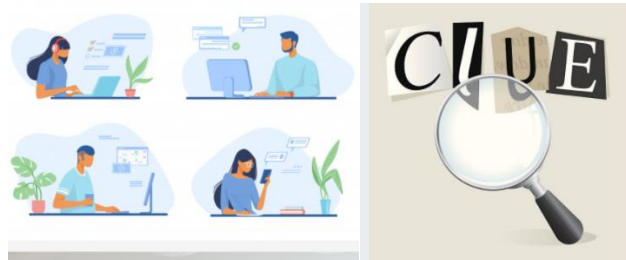
In my recently completed dissertation, I explored critical factors to bridge some problematic gaps between pragmatic practice and theory in pedagogy in the Japanese EFL classroom. I utilized the qualitative method of autoethnography where researchers use themselves as the research subject in order to understand the connectivity between self and others. Awareness of one's multiple identities and perspectives encourages a longer-term vision allowing a readiness for necessary transformation.



**Sanae Oda-Sheehan** is a graduate of Teachers College, Columbia University and recently received her PhD from Ochanomizu University. She teaches at Senshu University and also works as a communication consultant utilizing her business background. Her research interests include teacher identity, L2 pragmatics, and communicative task effectiveness.
